

In this edition we bring you an update on recruitment activity for both numbers of people joining the register and those from the register who have agreed to participate in research. With your support, over 10,000 service users have been asked about C4C thus far and 7,851 people consented to be contacted for research, we believe you would agree that the C4C register is thriving. However this would not be possible without your commitment. Thank you for your contributions to this very important and useful infrastructure for facilitating research.



Research participation using C4C register

The end user activity of the C4C register is also growing steadily, as 72 research studies are currently (including clinical trials) using the register to recruit participants. To date, 724 people have been identified and invited to some of these studies of whom 57% have agreed to take part in the studies (graph below). This is a remarkable step forward in achieving the Trust's ambition of making research opportunity accessible to service users. Furthermore, types of research studies range across all Clinical Academic Groups (CAGS) within the Trust.


